An edgy novel about friendship, coming-of-age and defining yourself in a world that sometimes ignores your value. Title: *Stormbreaker*  
Author: Anthony Horowitz  
Description: My son loved this book and its sequels. This is the first in the series of books that follows 14-year old "reluctant spy" Alex Rider during his quest to uncover the circumstances behind his guardian and uncle's death. If you are looking for a fast paced story that focuses on plot rather than character development, this is the book for you. One reviewer describes it as "James Bond for the Harry Potter Set." Title: *Secret History*  
Author: Donna Tartt  
Description: Part bildungsroman, part psychological thriller, part social satire, this novel follows the journey of "lower-class" narrator Richard Hagen from California to a small elite college in Vermont. This is a well-written that has richly textured characters. It is intellectual and philosophical, a book that will make you ponder the capacity for evil within us all. Greek and Latin scholars will love the allusions in this novel. Secret History is definitely a modern classic and a book I loved so much that I read it twice.

Title: *Cutting For Stone*  
Author: Abraham Verghese  
Description: I have to admit that I am only halfway through this book, but I love it so much and it came so highly recommended that it must be on my list. Marion and Shiva are twin brothers born of a secret union between an Indian nun and a British surgeon. After she dies in childbirth and the surgeon disappears, the twins are raised in an Ethiopian mission hospital. Spanning years and traveling from Addis Ababa to New York City and back, Cutting For Stone is a story of love and betrayal in a land on the brink of revolution. Students with an interest in science and medicine will be drawn to the medical aspects in this novel.

Title: *Night*  
Author: Elie Wiesel  
Description: This is a short memoir of a the final year of the Holocaust - a year which the author spent in Auschwitz. This memoir begs the question: to what extent are we witnesses of history and messengers to humanity? Though this is admittedly a sad read, what prevails for me is humankind's amazing resiliency.

Title: *The Pearl*  
Author: John Steinbeck  
Description: Like his father and grandfather before him, Kino is a poor diver. Then, on a day like any other, Kino emerges from the sea with a pearl as large as a sea gull's egg, as "perfect as the moon." With the pearl comes hope, and the promise of comfort and of security. A story of classic simplicity, based on a Mexican folktale, **The Pearl** explores the secrets of man's nature, the darkest depths of evil, and the luminous possibilities of love.

Title: *The House On Mango Street*  
Author: Sandra Cisneros  
Description: A a short fictional work told in a series of vignettes – sometimes heartbreaking, sometimes deeply joyous – it is the story of a young Latina girl growing up in Chicago, inventing for herself who and what she will become. Though this text is seemingly simple to read, it invites a sophisticated analysis of and conversation with both the author and the main character.

Title: *The Giver*  
Author: Lois Lowry  
Description: Sometimes you are lucky enough to find a book you can read over and over again. For me, this is one of those books. Jonas's world is perfect. Everything is under control. Title: *Bradbury Stories: 100 of His Most Celebrated Tales*  
Author: Ray Bradbury

Spanning six decades of his astonishing career, here is a retrospective collection of 100 magnificent stories that confirms this literary genius's status as a master of short fiction.

Title: *Snow in August*  
Author: Pete Hamill  
Description: A story of New York City shortly after the end of World War II. The novel was written by a lifelong resident of the city whose love and knowledge of the area can be felt on every page. Set in a working-class Brooklyn neighborhood in 1947, this poignant tale revolves around two of the most endearing characters in recent fiction: an 11-year-old Irish Catholic boy named Michael Devlin and Rabbi Judah Hirsch, a refugee from Prague.

Title: *Adventures of Huckleberry Finn*  
Author: Mark Twain  
Description: A classic story that helps us understand our history and heritage as well as experiencing Twain's unique style. "Climb aboard the raft with Huck and Jim and drift away from the "sivilized" life and into a world of adventure, excitement, danger, and self-discovery. Huck's shrewd and humorous narrative is complemented by lyrical descriptions of the Mississippi valley and a sparkling cast of memorable characters." (Amazon)

Title: *The Lovely Bones*  
Author: Alice Sebold  
Description: A heartbreaking but gripping story of a young girl, the injustice she suffers and her own revenge. "My name was Salmon, like the fish; first name, Susie. I was fourteen when I was murdered on December 6, 1973. "This is the story of Susie Salmon, who is adjusting to her new home as she is watching life on earth continue without her -- her friends trading rumors about her disappearance, her killer trying to cover his tracks, her grief-stricken family unraveling. Author: Richard Adams

Title: *Room*

Author: Emma Donoghue

Description: This clever new novel is written from the perspective of five-year-old Jack who has lived in one room with his mother for his entire life. His mother manages to make the room (which has been her prison for seven years) expand to be a world of imagination, love, and possibility.

Title: *The Good Good Pig*

Author: Sy Montgomery

Description: This non-fiction story charts the relationship between the author and a pig. When she brought the tiny orphan piglet home in a box, she never imagined he would grow to be 750 pounds and have such an enormous influence on her personal life, her understanding of what it means to be human and her connection to others in her community. Sy Montgomery is a noted naturalist who has travelled the world researching animals, but what she learned on her own farm is so tender and funny it will make any reader think of animals and themselves in a new light.
